2. Brief Description of Firm, including qualifications, experience and ability to be the Charter Revision Commission's legal advisor.

Attorney Steven G. Home Rule: As I hope you will see in the response to your questions, my experience in government covers the gamut of issues from major technology transactions to contract negotiation, from specialized construction litigation to the analysis of government systems and advising on alternate structures of governance. I have also been retained by clients to conduct thorough due diligence investigations on a variety of issues. While most of my legal work for municipalities and government has been transactional, I did argue, early in my legal career, the home rule case which led to the repeal of "recall" in Connecticut, Simons v. Canty, 195 Conn. 524 (1985). My ten years as an Alder and two terms as Corporation Counsel in New Haven also brought me into the world of Home Rule and Title 7 of the General Statutes.

I approach Charter Revision, particularly a wide-ranging revision process, as an exercise that mixes a strong legal foundation in order to reach practical solutions within a political context. As a result, the Charter commissions I work with have become used to the seminars and round tables that walk our commissioners through the notion of what "home rule" means: from Dillon's Rule to the Home Rule Act and the 1965 Constitution.

Express Grants of Authority: The roundtables take a long and hard look at the issue of legal authority. This involves a review of the interaction between Title 7 and historical Special Acts that remain active in the Charter. It also takes into account the impact of MERA and collective bargaining agreements have on local law. At the end of the process CRC Commissioners are fully acquainted with the notion that local governments have no inherent powers and that silence is not authority. If there is no express grant of authority there is no authority.

Review of the Document. The Stamford CRC has been in the field since, at least, April. One of the projects I would have conducted several months ago would have been a walk-through of the document in order to assess where the problem areas and potholes are. I usually do this in conjunction with the Corporation Counsel. It is a good starting point and usually leads to a better understanding of the structure of the document. Again, the issue is to understand the charter as a relevant governing document.

As a result, they are quite familiar with the applicable statutes and the types of charter provisions that other towns have employed and are able to proactively suggest changes that may improve the clarity of the wording or the function of the governmental process.

The above definitions apply to the contract compliance requirements by virtue of Section 46a-68j-21(11) of the Contract Compliance Regulations.

The awarding agency will consider the following factors when reviewing the bidder's qualifications under the contract compliance requirements:

- (a) the bidder's success in implementing an affirmative action plan;
