

THE MAYOR'S YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (MYEP)-

- Since 2011 currently in 14th summer
- 942 students served over 14 years
- Current junior and senior high school Stamford residents eligible
- 6-week program
 - a. 140 hours of paid work at \$15.69 an hour
 - b. 30 hours of work readiness class time

ALL FUNDS GO TO INTERN SALARIES / Michelle Lappas- The Program Manager is the only city staff person.

The city provides Michelle Lappas salary in Youth Services and \$25,000 toward the program The number of interns is determined by grant/business sponsorship and donation funding sourced by Youth Services.

NEW FUNDING FOR 2024: Grant donations cover 88% of costs

- 1. Awarded \$20,000 from Summer of Jobs Connect Academy/Cities for Financial

 Empowerment for 2024. The CFE Fund is working with over 30 city governments to connect youth workers to appropriate bank and credit union products and meaningful financial education and is welcoming new local governments to this work through Summer Jobs Connect Academy. Provides funding for:
 - a. State IDs for students
 - b. Financial Literacy training
 - c. Funds for an administrative app to support the program
 - d. Bus passes
 - e. Connect 21% of students who were <u>non-banked</u> to one of four community bank <u>Youth Safe</u> account Partners (M&T, Bank of America, Savings Bank of Danbury, and Sound Federal Credit)
- 2. Awarded \$20,800 from the partnership with SPS ALTA (supporting Hispanic students) for sponsorship of 10 students
- 3. Awarded \$30,000 from a Private Family Foundation grant after hearing about the program
- 4. Working with <u>Bank of America</u> to support small businesses to student interns through grant funding (Dr. McClean, Elm Consulting, EazyPrickz, Tiffany Outdoor, and Ordered Steps Day Care) \$15,000. (This is the first year BofA focused funding on small business supporters of MYEP since 2013)
