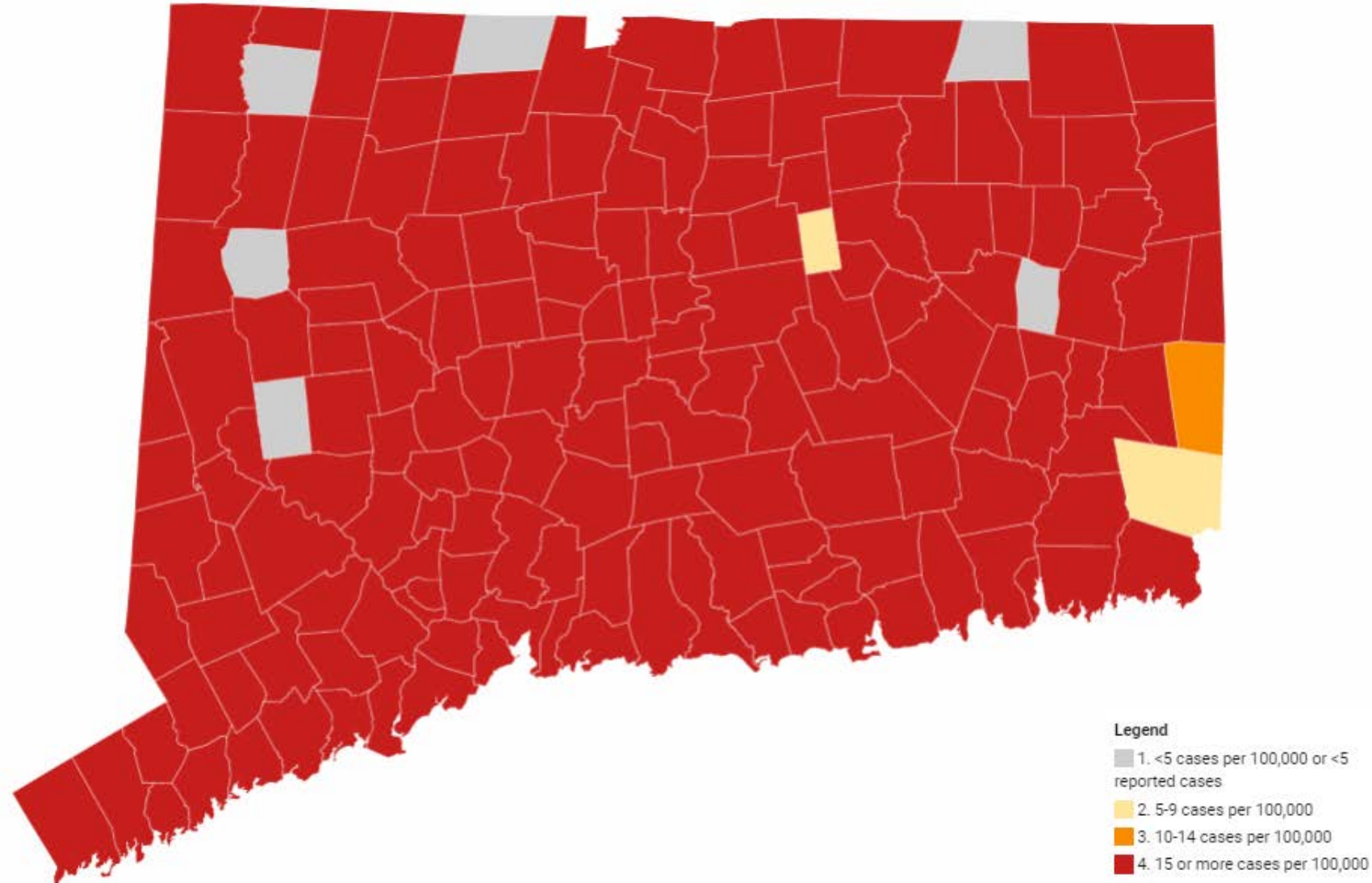

Average Daily Rate of COVID-19 Cases Among Persons Living in Community Settings per 100,000 Population By Town

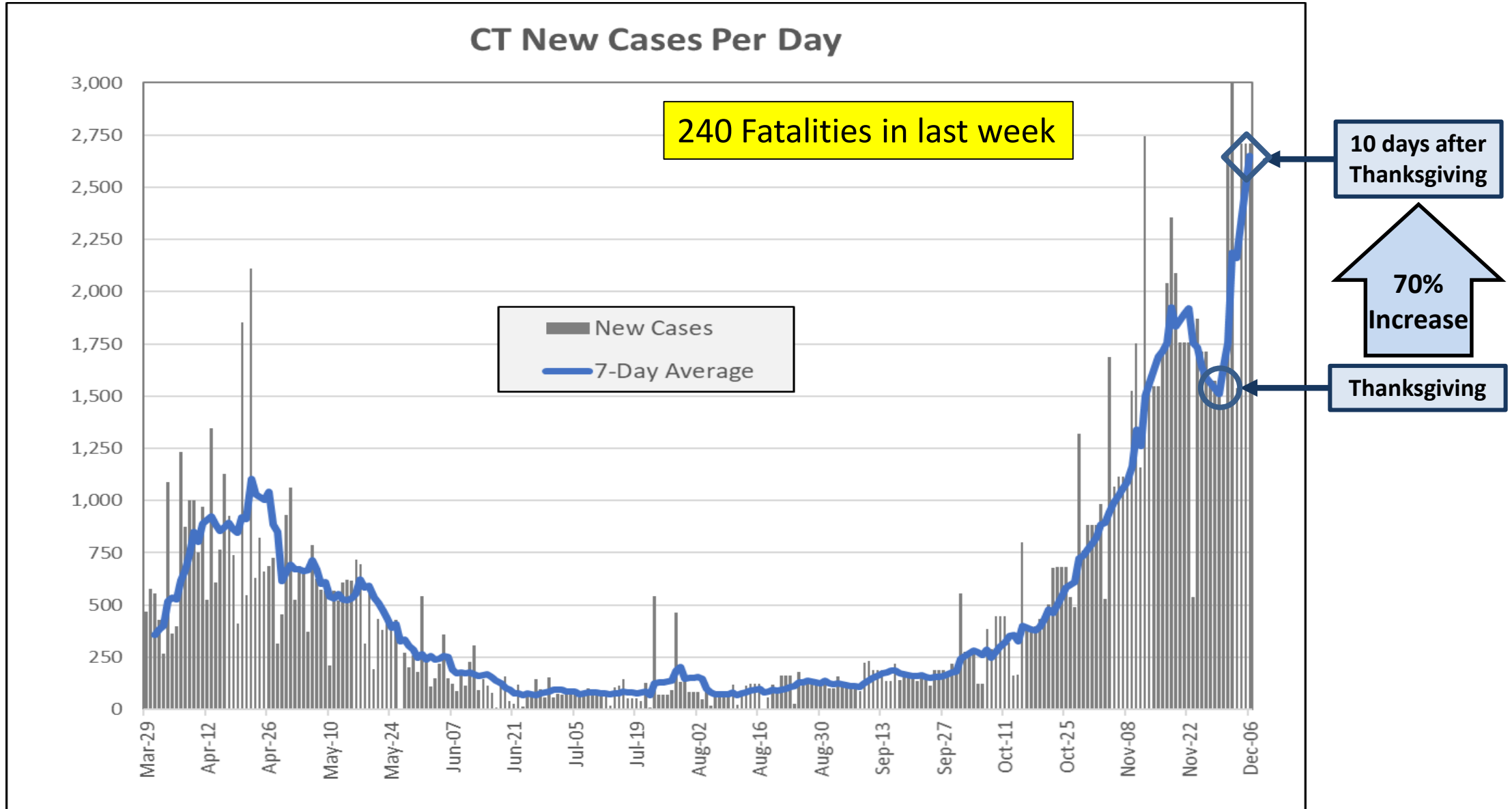

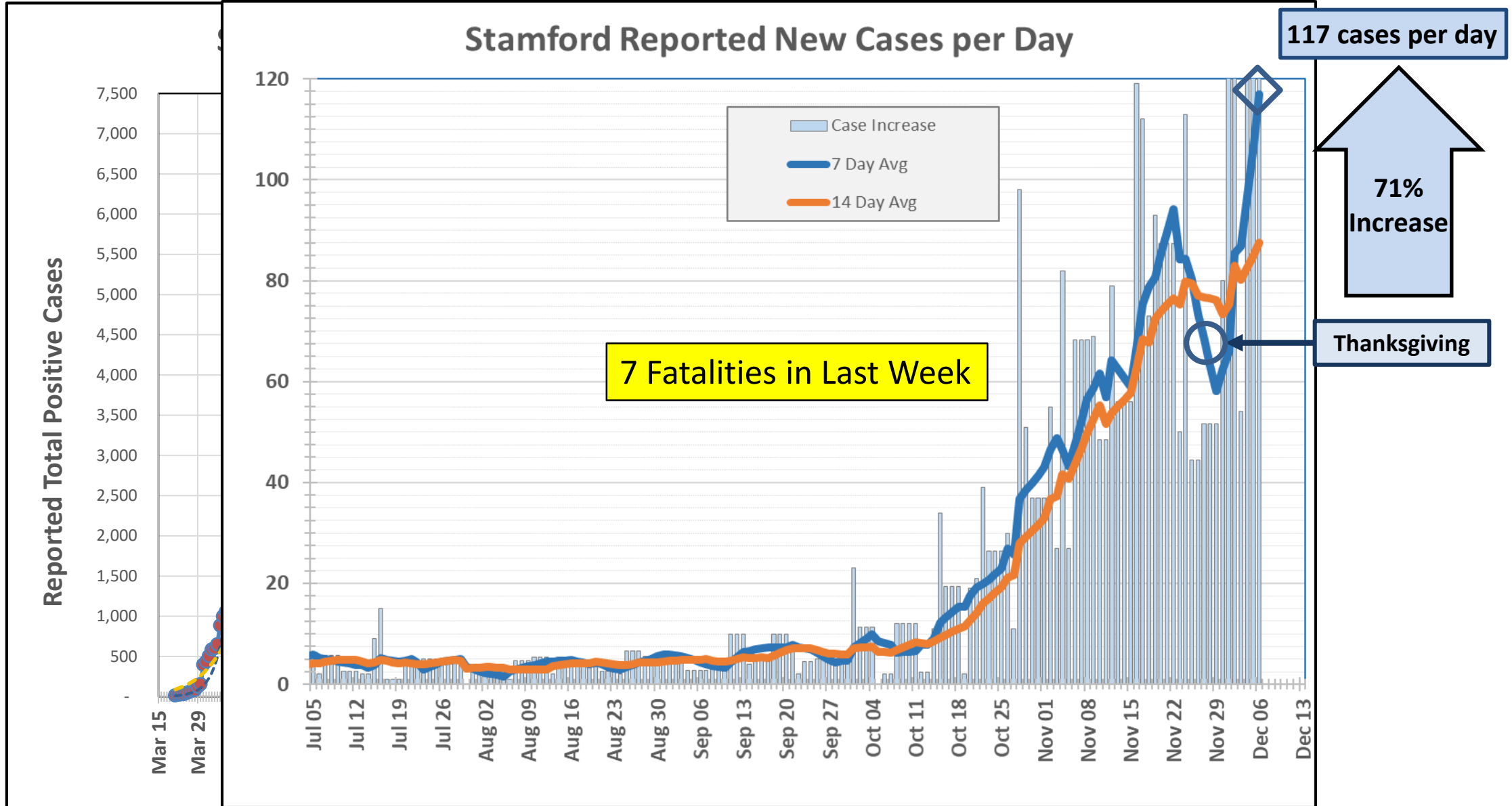

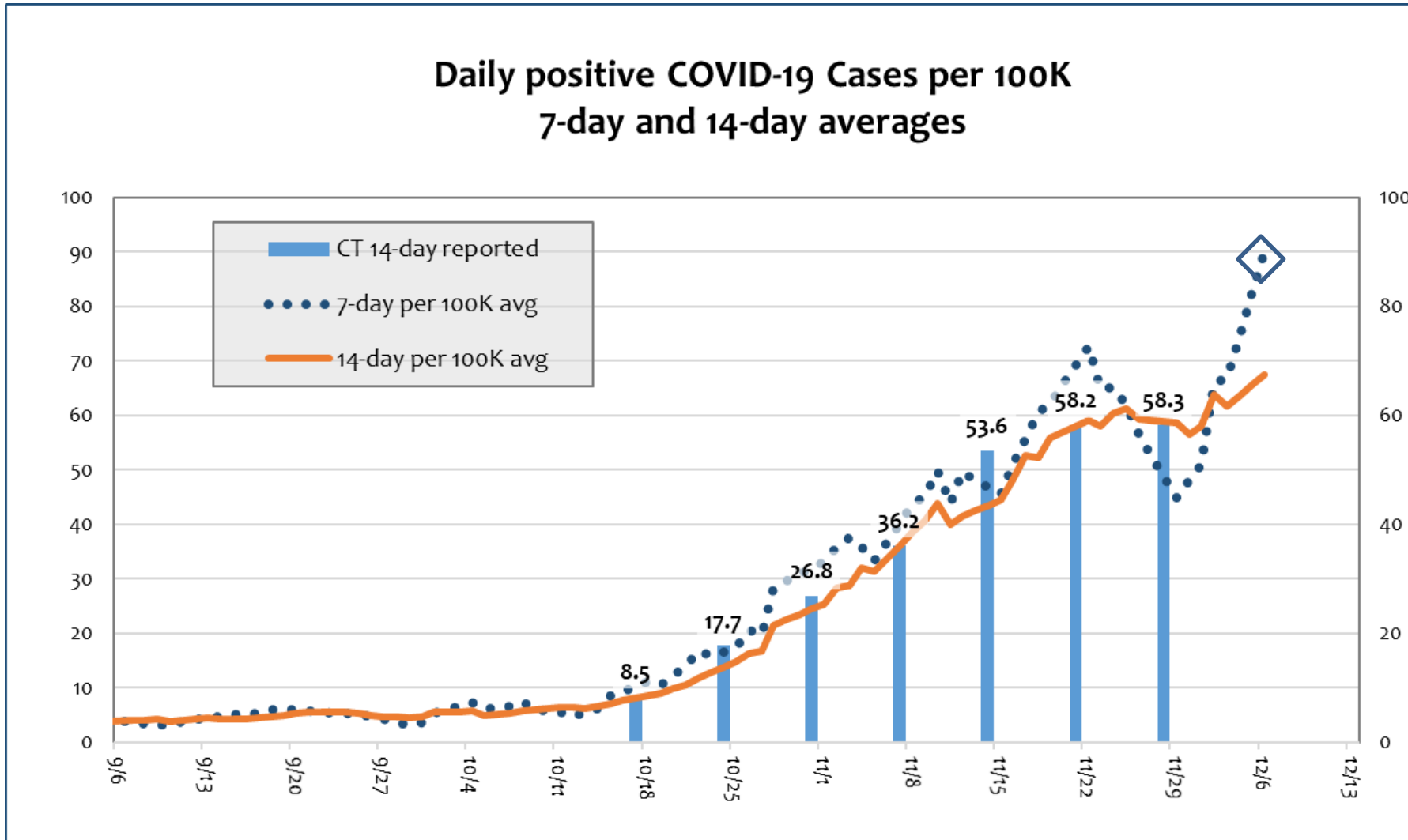

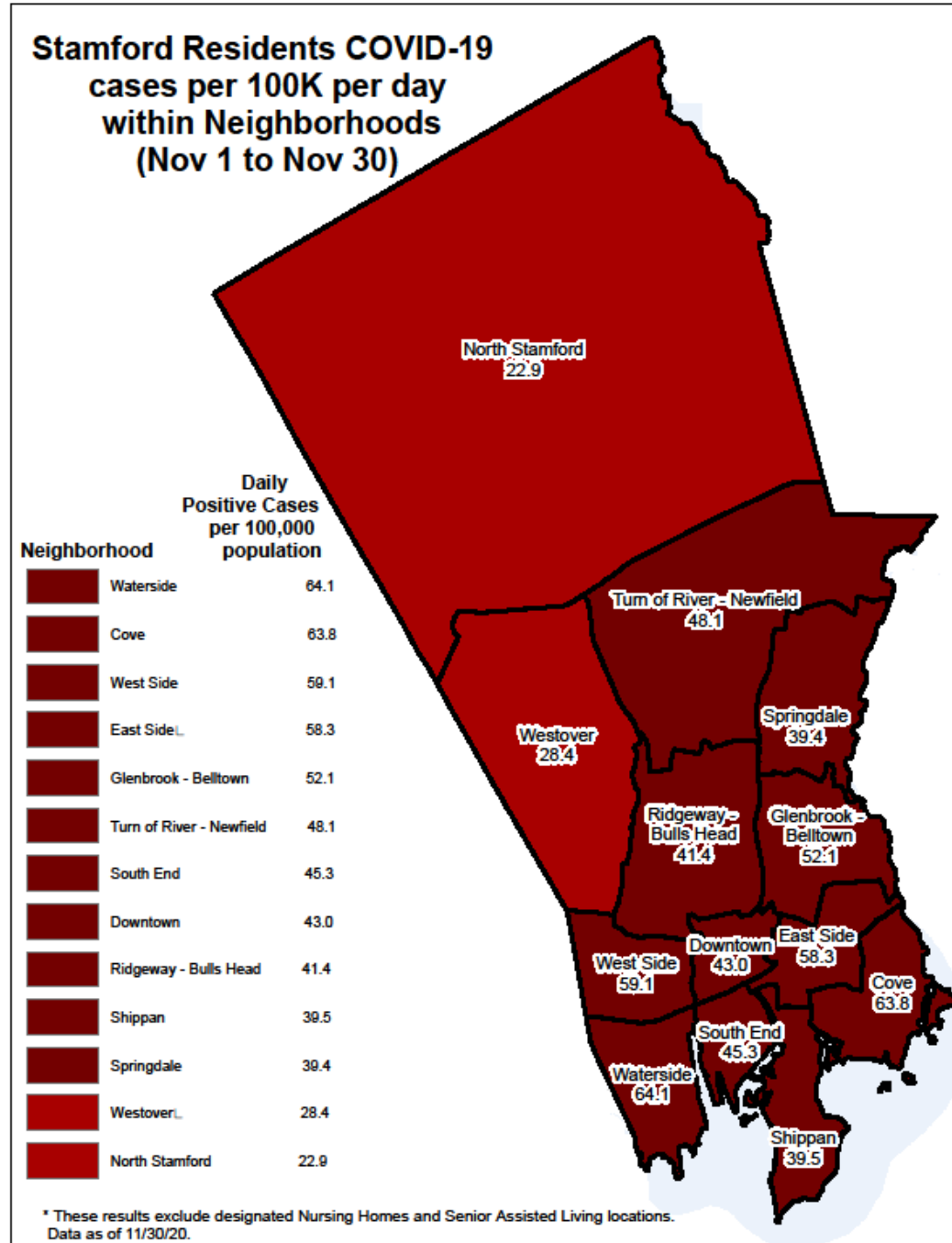

State of the City: COVID19 Neighborhood Case Levels



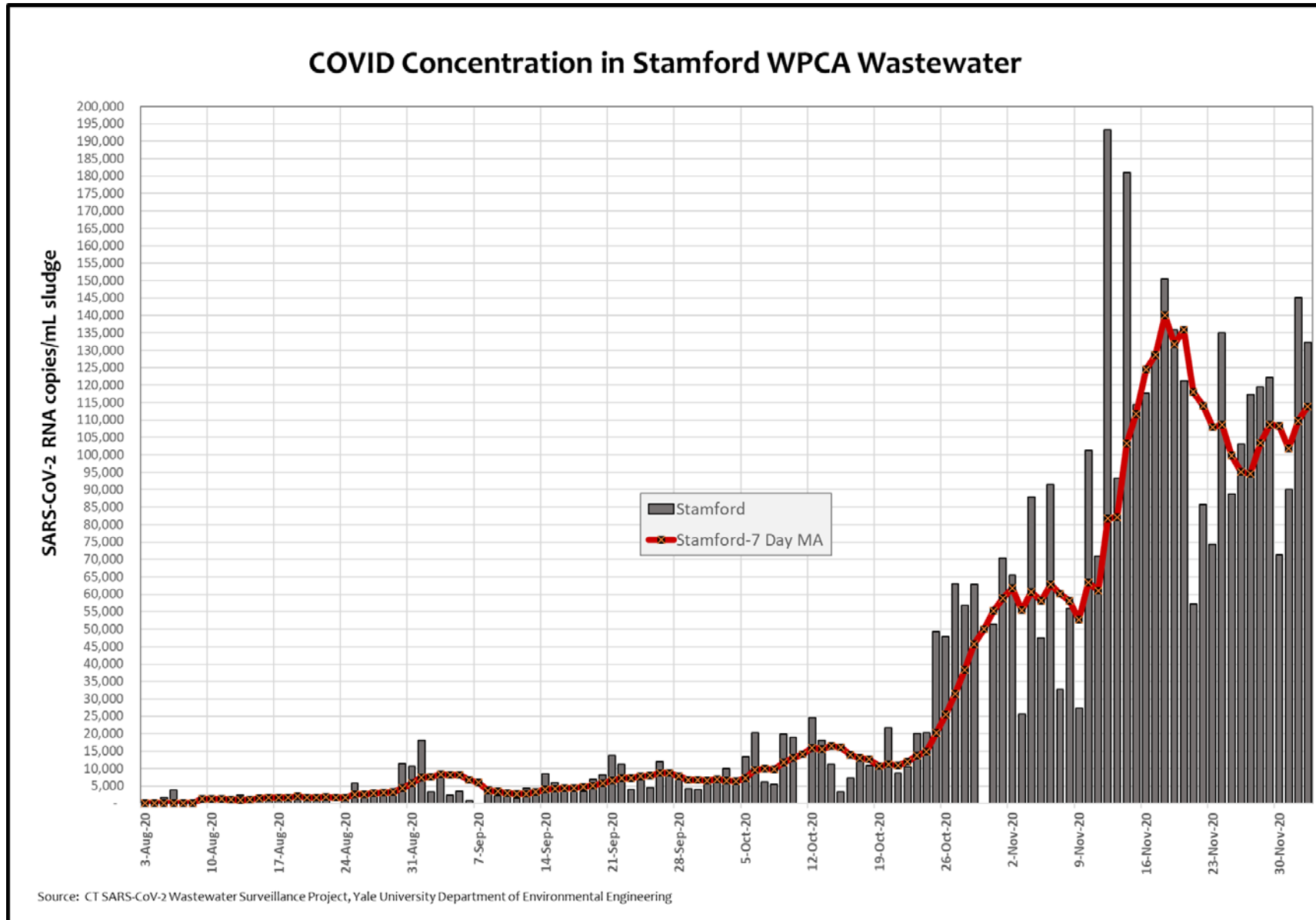

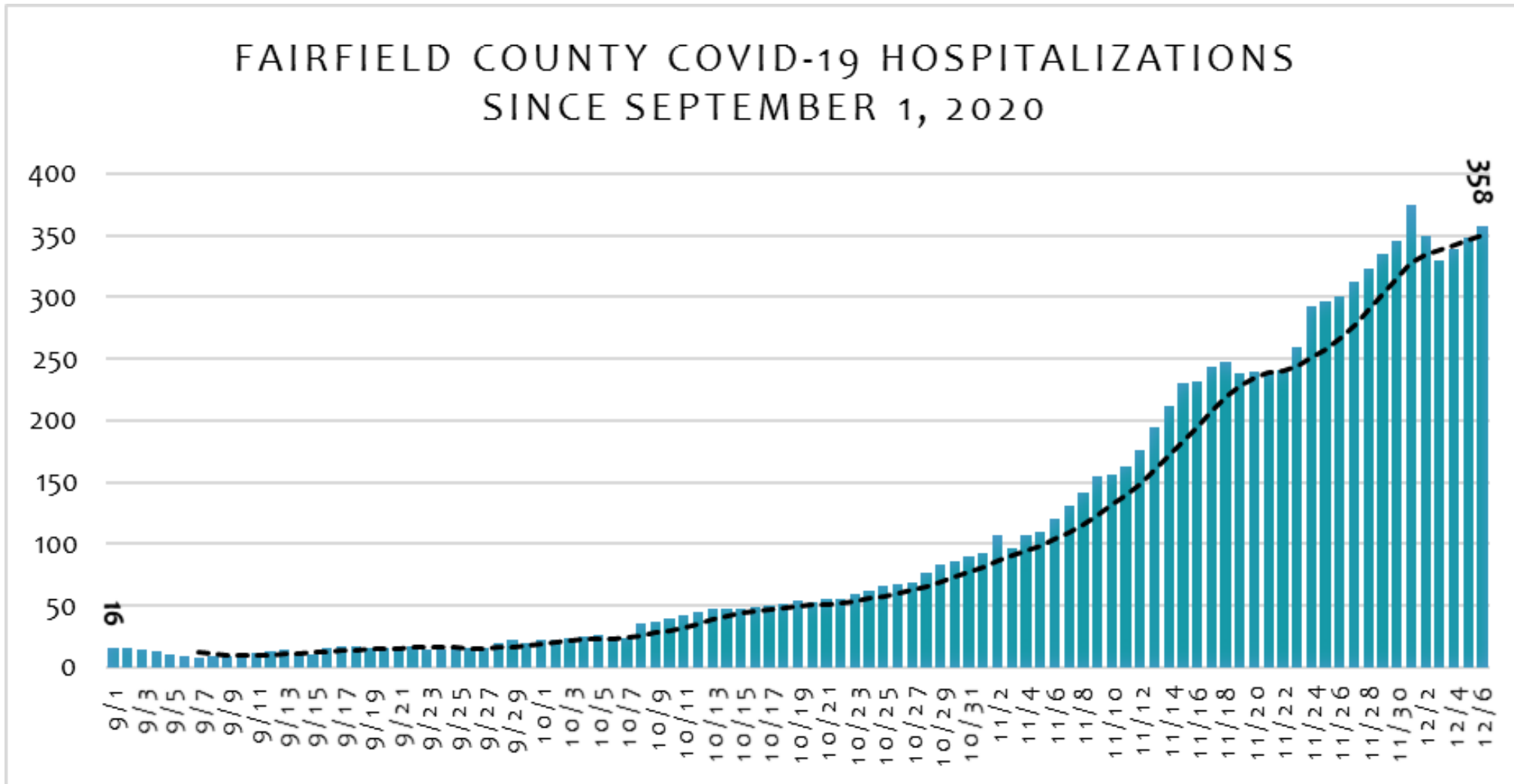

WPCA Wastewater COVID Concentration

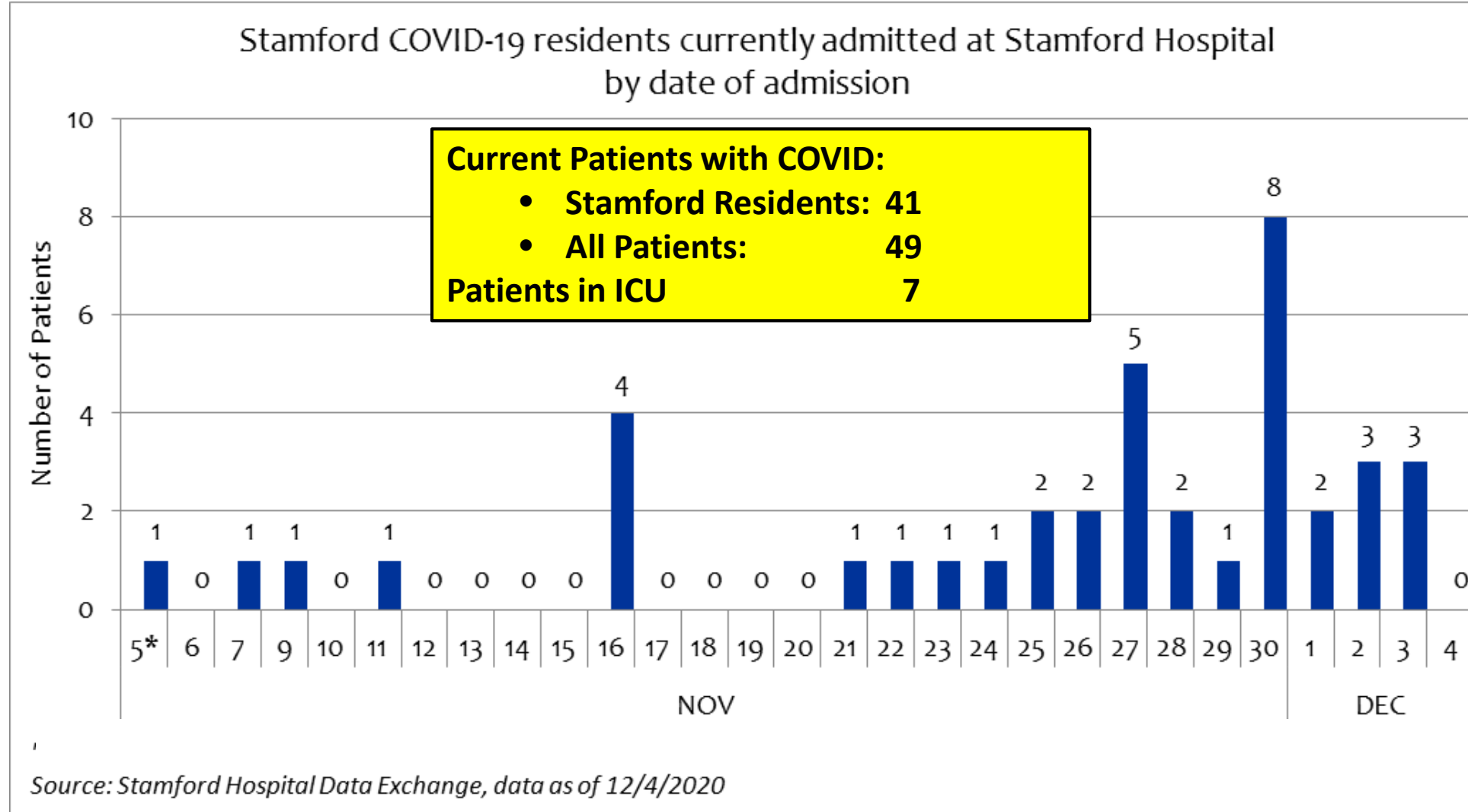

COVID-19 Dashboard

Stamford Public Schools (SPS) is committed to providing transparent, accurate and timely information regarding cases of COVID-19 in our district. When SPS receives notification of a positive case, the Stamford Department of Health will conduct contact tracing. Families and/or staff members who were in close contact will be notified of the need to quarantine or self-isolate.

IMPORTANT NOTES:

- Dashboard data includes SPS staff and students only.
- Contact tracing occurs following each positive test result.
- Close contact is defined as an individual who was within 6 feet or closer, for 15 minutes or more.
- In keeping with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, and other privacy protection laws, SPS will always maintain the confidentiality of students or staff members, and no data will be provided that could be linked to identifiable information.



The following information will be updated weekly.

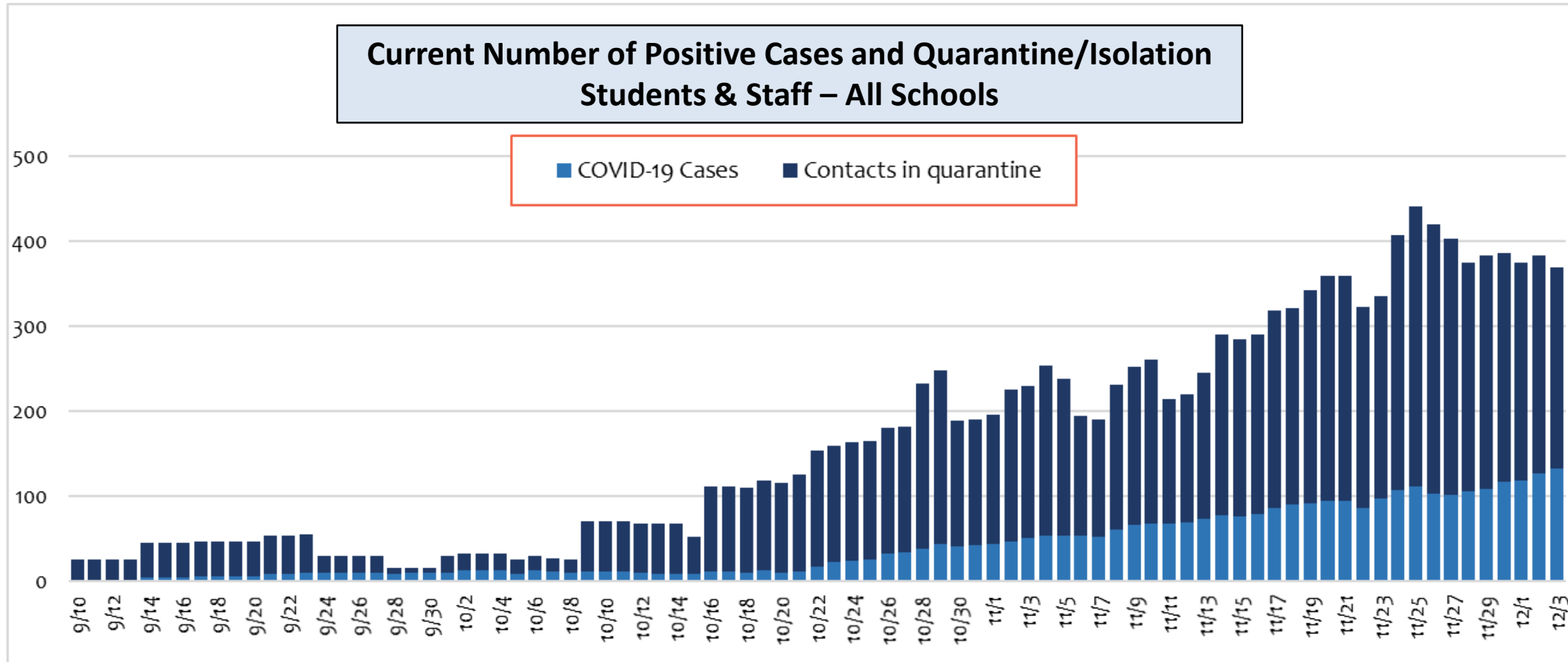

Department of Health Update

- **COVID-19 Vaccination – What do we know?**
 - **Vaccines**
 - Pfizer and Moderna
 - Both are not live virus vaccines
 - Both are Synthetic vaccines which will stimulate your cells to make antibodies against the COVID-19 virus
 - Two doses are needed with the **SAME** vaccine
 - Target age group is 18 years and older
 - Currently they are Undergoing **Emergency Use Authorization (EUA)** review by the FDA
 - Vaccines are **FREE** to everyone



State of the City: COVID19

Department of Health Update



- **Vaccine Distribution**
 - Phase 1- Limited supply of COVID-19 vaccine available
 - Phase 2- Large number of vaccine doses available
 - Phase 3- Sufficient supply of vaccine doses for entire population
- **Who decides which sector gets vaccinated in each phase?**
 - State Allocation Committee
 - Very dynamic — will vary depending on vaccine supply
- **Critical populations will be vaccinated first**
 - Critical infrastructure workforce
 - People at increased risk of severe COVID-19 illness
 - People at increased risk of acquiring or transmitting COVID-19
 - People with limited access to routine vaccination services

Department of Health Update

- ***Who will get vaccinated when?***
 - **Phase 1A (Very high risk of exposure)**
 - Critical Infrastructure workforce
 - Healthcare workers
 - First responders
 - COVID-19 vaccinators
 - Persons at increased risk of COVID-19 illness
 - Long term care
 - **Phase 1B (Essential functions of society/risk of severe COVID-19 illness)**
 - Critical Infrastructure workforce
 - Critical municipal employees – including teaching staff
 - Others being decided
 - Persons at increased risk of COVID-19 illness
 - Persons 65 years and older
 - Persons with underlying medical conditions
 - **Phases 2 & 3 will expand to the general population**

Department of Health Update

- **What is Stamford Department of Health doing?**
 - Working with DPH
 - Working with regional partners
 - Working with City agencies
 - We have completed our COVID-19 Vaccine Provider Agreement with DPH
 - Undergoing required Federal and State training for staff
 - Identifying staff for vaccination teams
 - Purchasing equipment and supplies
 - We will be reaching out to the various communities as we learn more

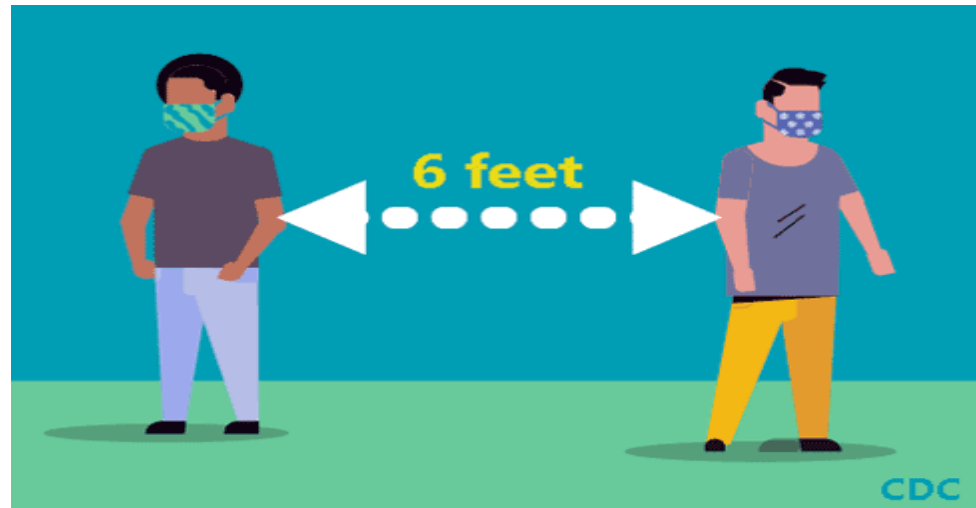
Department of Health Update

- **There is still a lot that we don't know**
 - Vaccine administration and distribution
 - When will local health get vaccines?
 - How much vaccines will be allotted to Stamford?
 - What will be the time lag between phases?
 - Vaccine specific information
 - How long will the vaccine immunity last?
 - Will there be a need for annual revaccination like the flu vaccine?
 - What are all the potential adverse reactions?

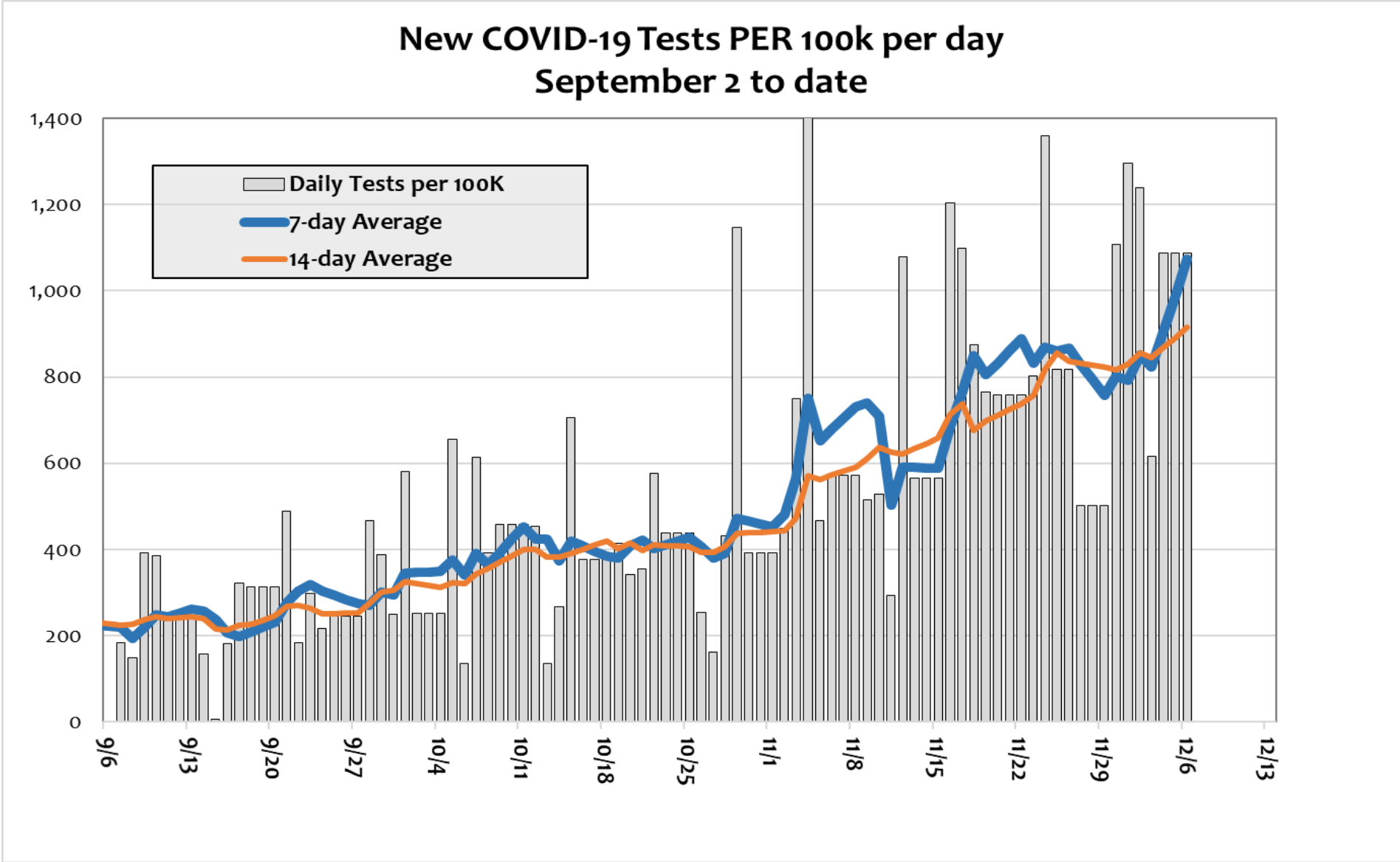
Department of Health Update

 - Wear a mask and wear it properly
 - Wash your hands frequently
 - Social distance

Testing



When to Get Tested

- **Who Should Get Tested (Per CDC Guidelines)?**

- People who have symptoms of COVID-19.
- People who have had [close contact](#) (within 6 feet for a total of 15 minutes or more over a 24 hour period) with someone with confirmed COVID-19.
- People who have taken part in activities that put them at higher risk for COVID-19 because they cannot socially distance as needed, such as travel, attending large social or mass gatherings, or being in crowded indoor settings.
- People who have been asked or referred to get testing by their healthcare provider, local or state health department.

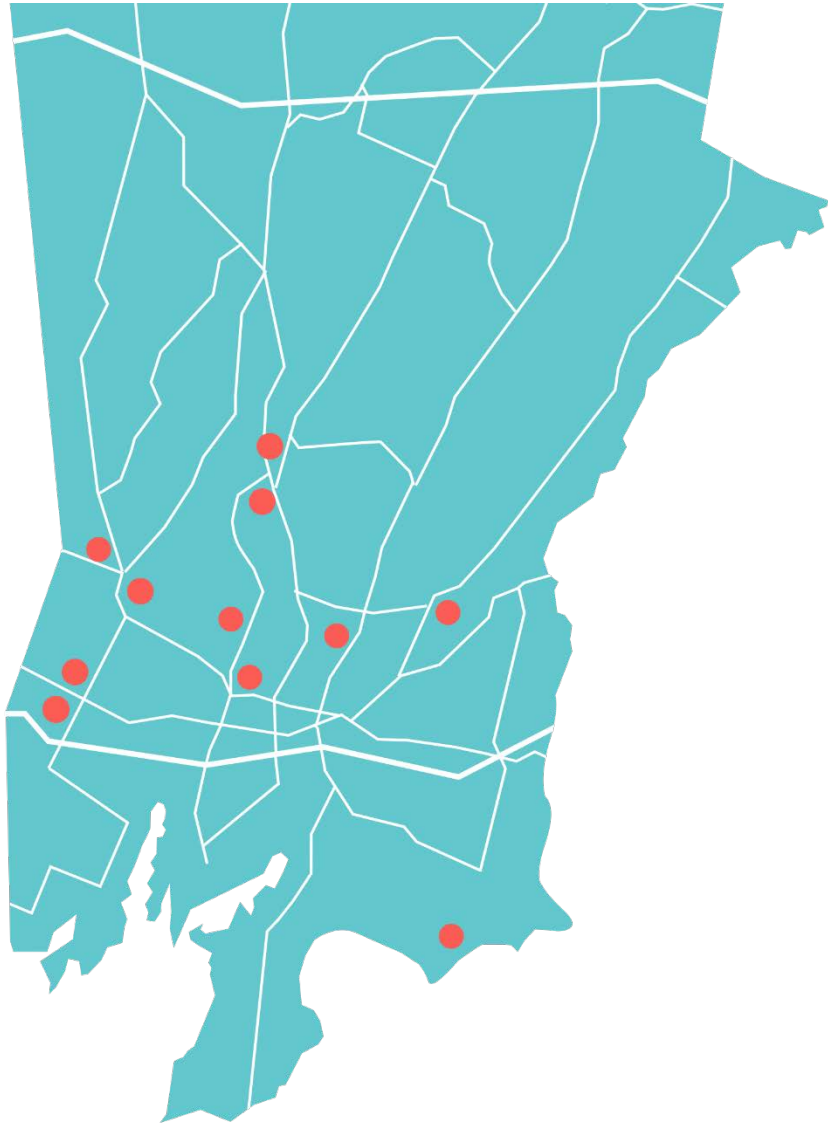
- **When should I test if I've been exposed?**

- Tests are most accurate five to seven days after exposure
- PCR tests are more accurate than rapid antigen tests but can still give false negatives
- If you have symptoms, get tested immediately

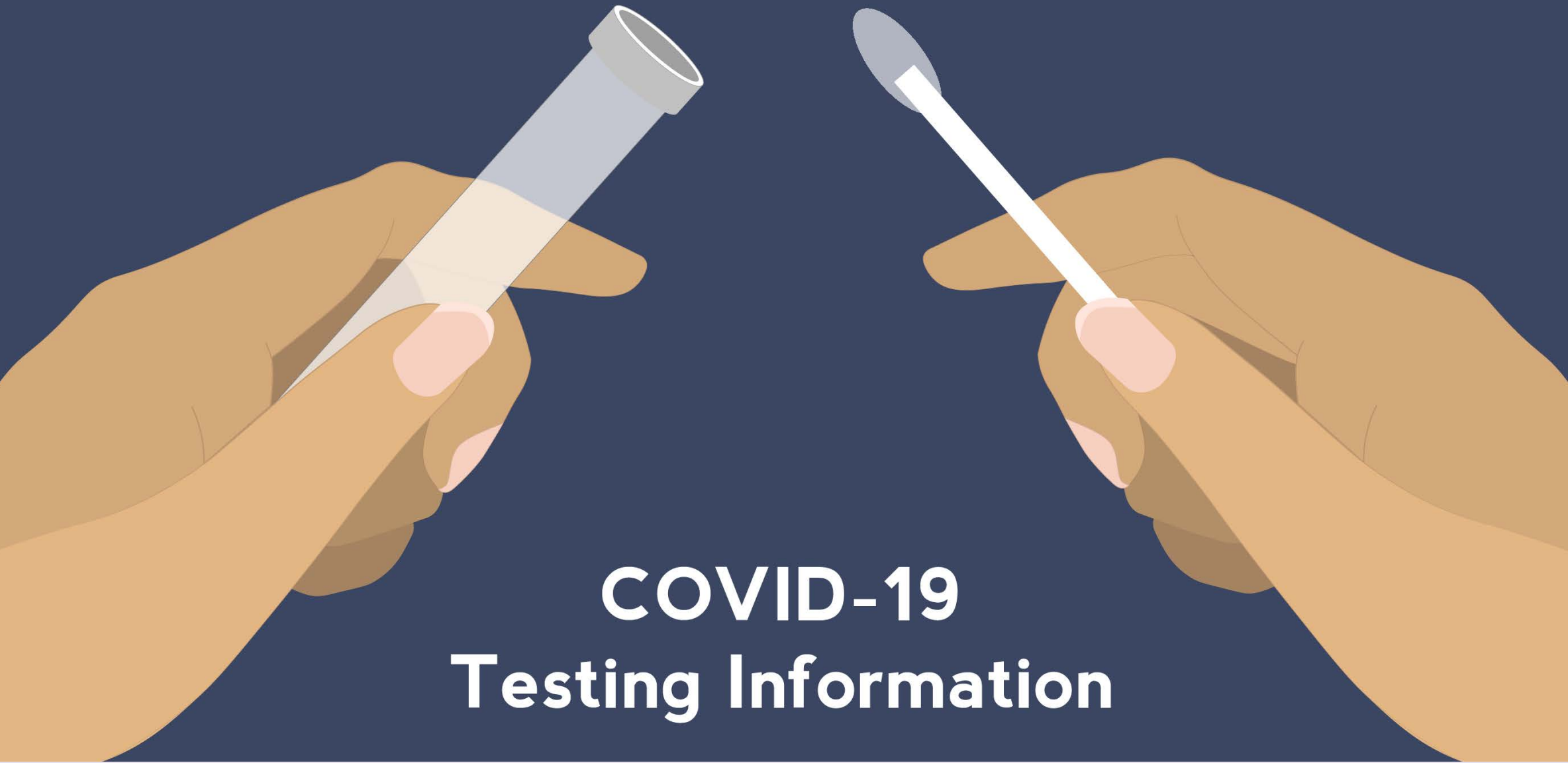


- **Free Testing Sites (no insurance necessary):**

- Scalzi Park (daily, 8:30am - 4pm)
- UConn Stamford (M-F, 9am - 4pm)
- 60 Palmer's Hill Road (M-F, 10am - 2pm)
- Stamford High School Hillandale Parking Lot
 - Sundays, 10am-2pm
 - Tuesdays, 4pm-7pm

- **Other testing sites in Stamford require insurance**

- Testing is generally covered by insurance
- Check with your carrier to confirm coverage
