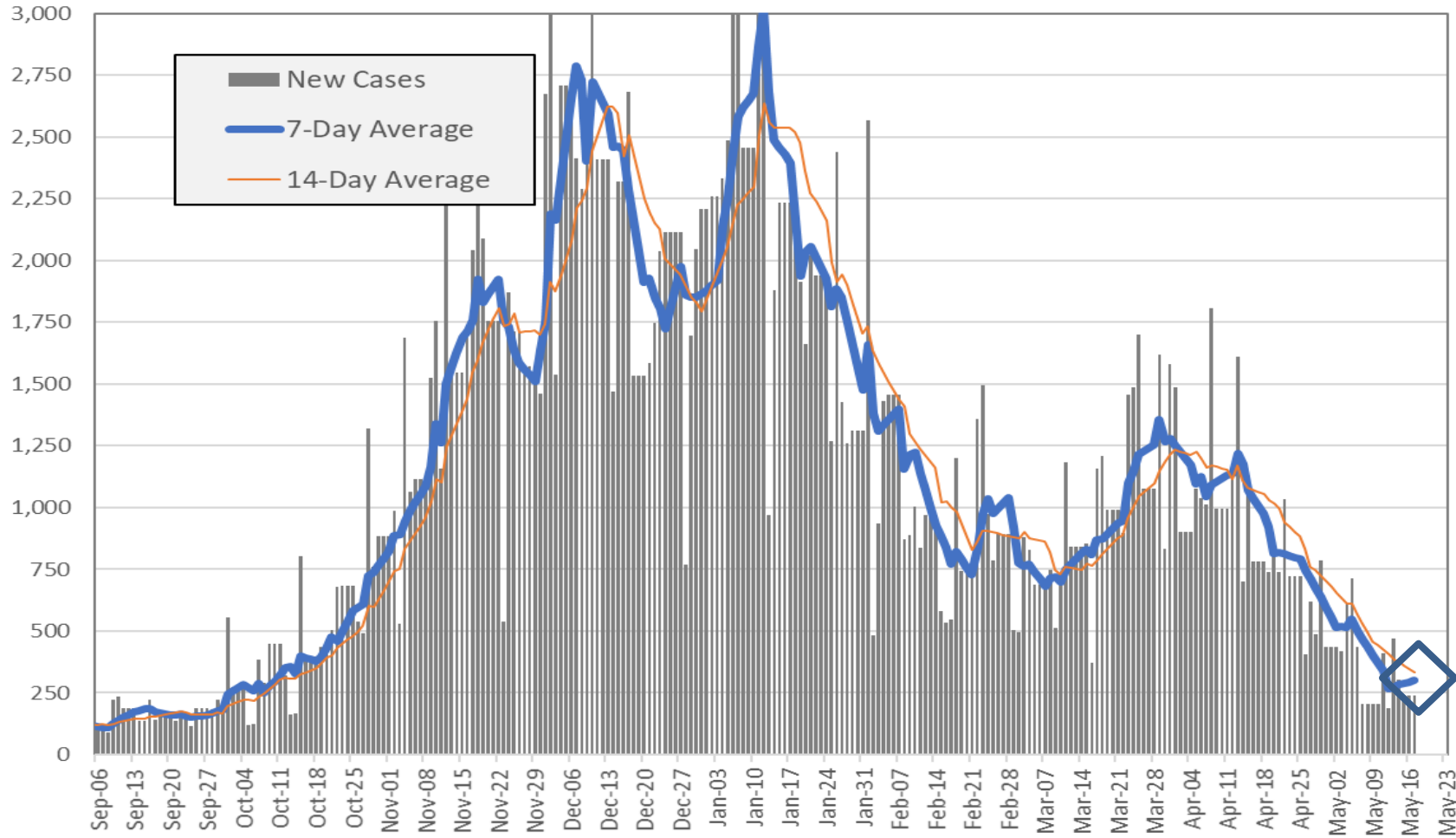

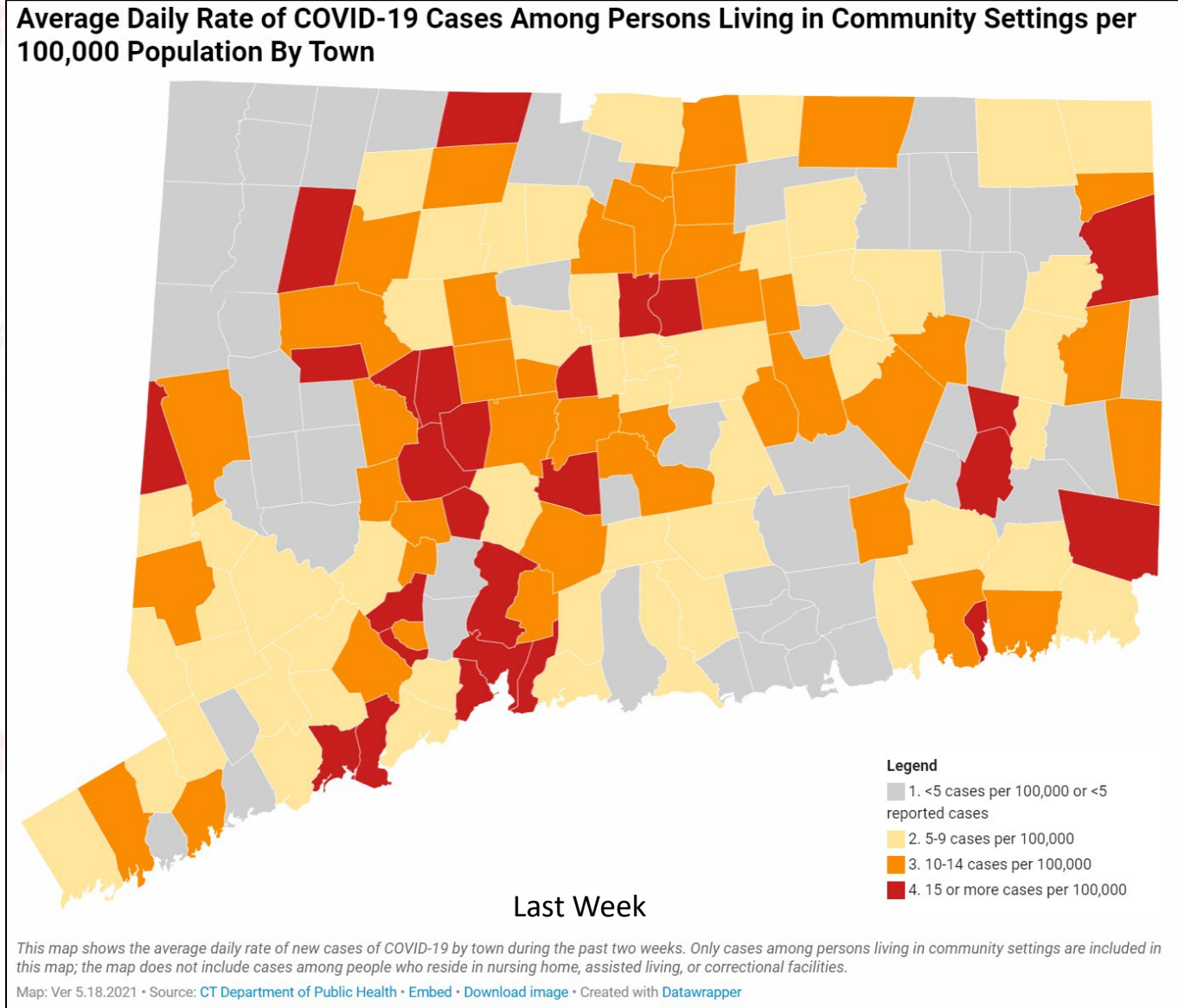
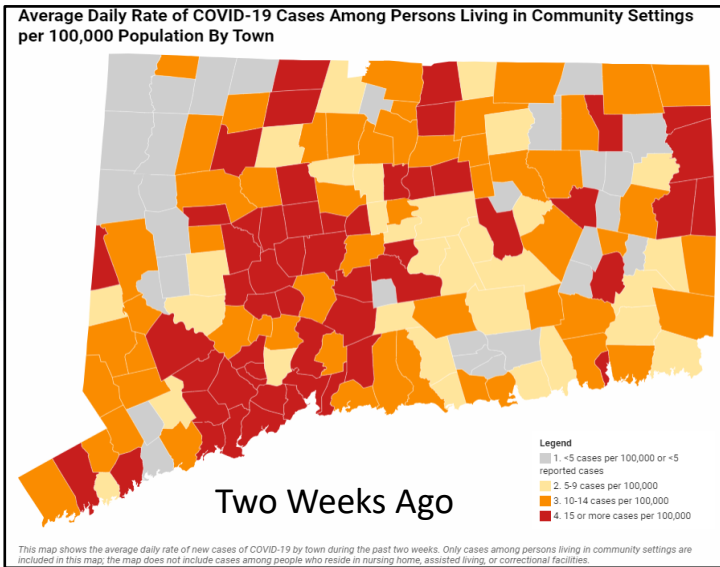
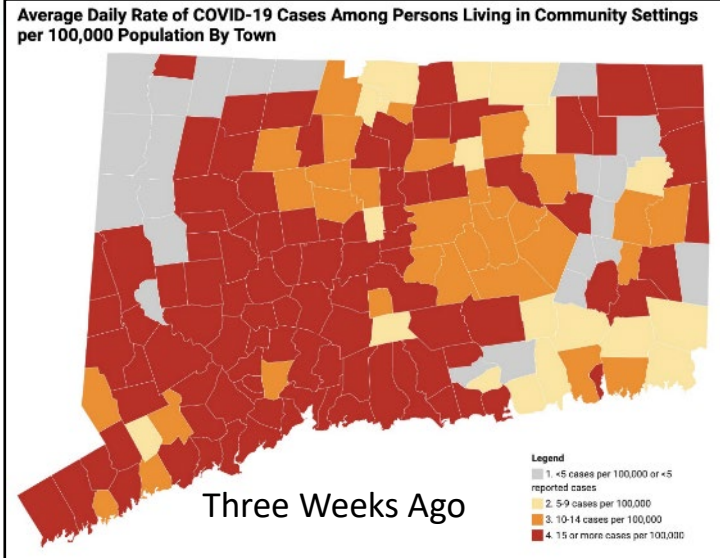
CT New Cases Per Day

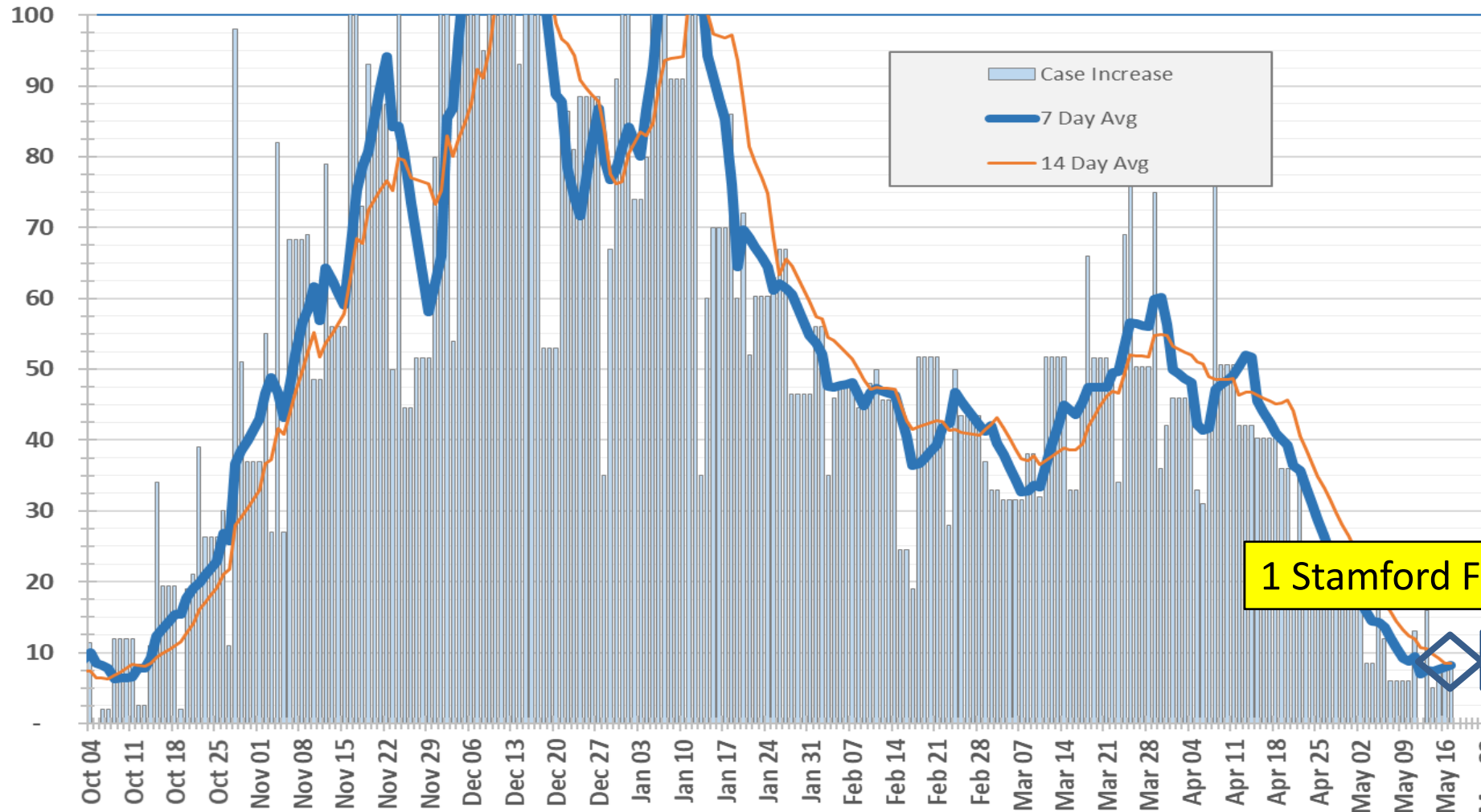

Stamford Reported New Cases per Day

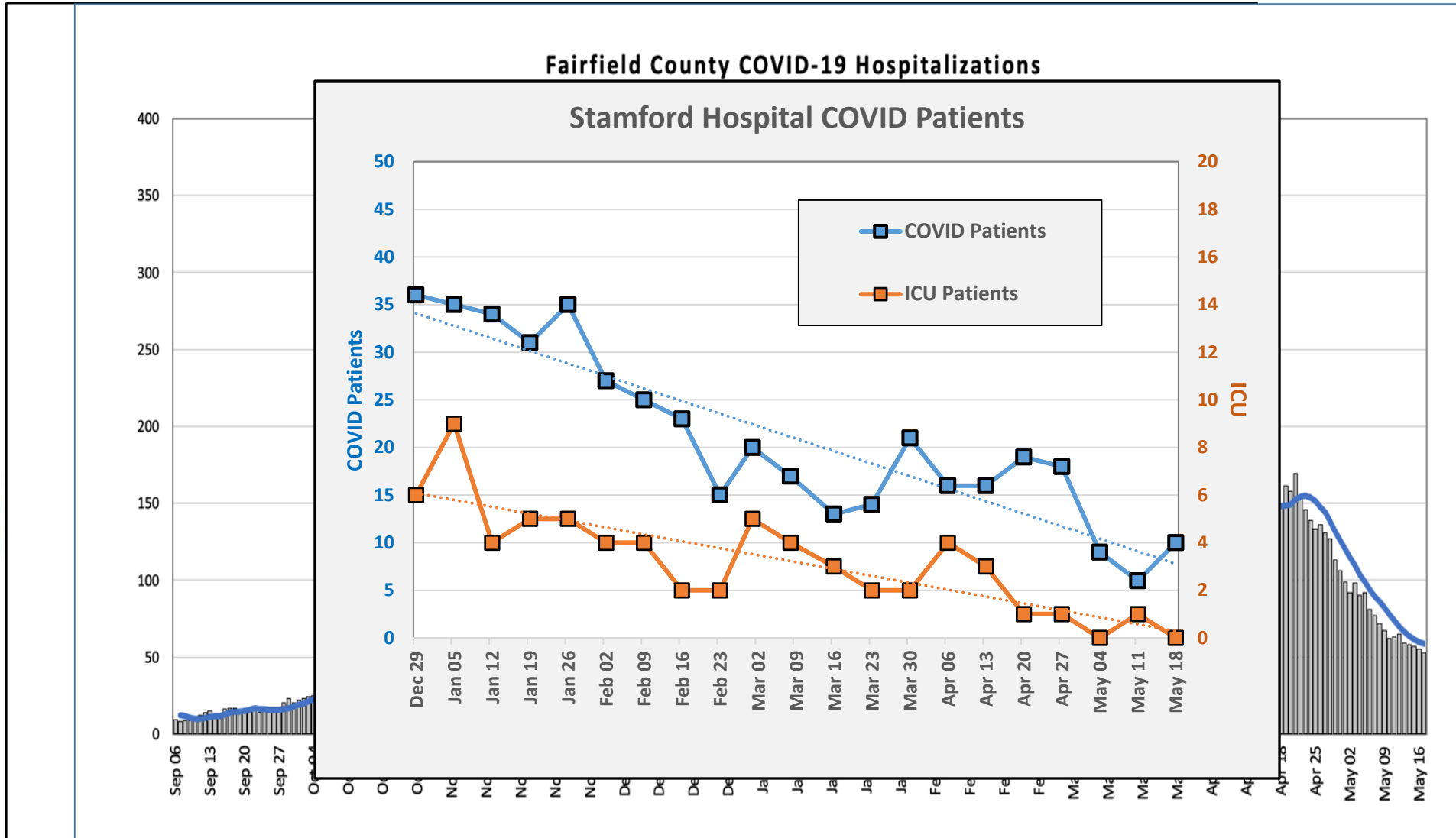

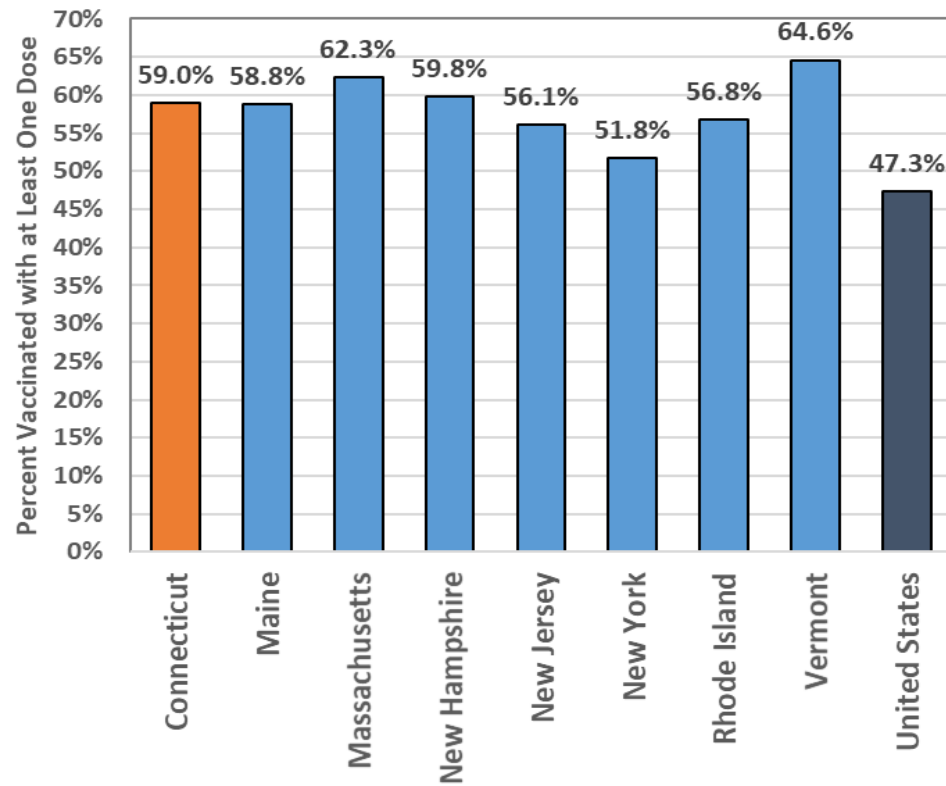
Hospitalization Rate



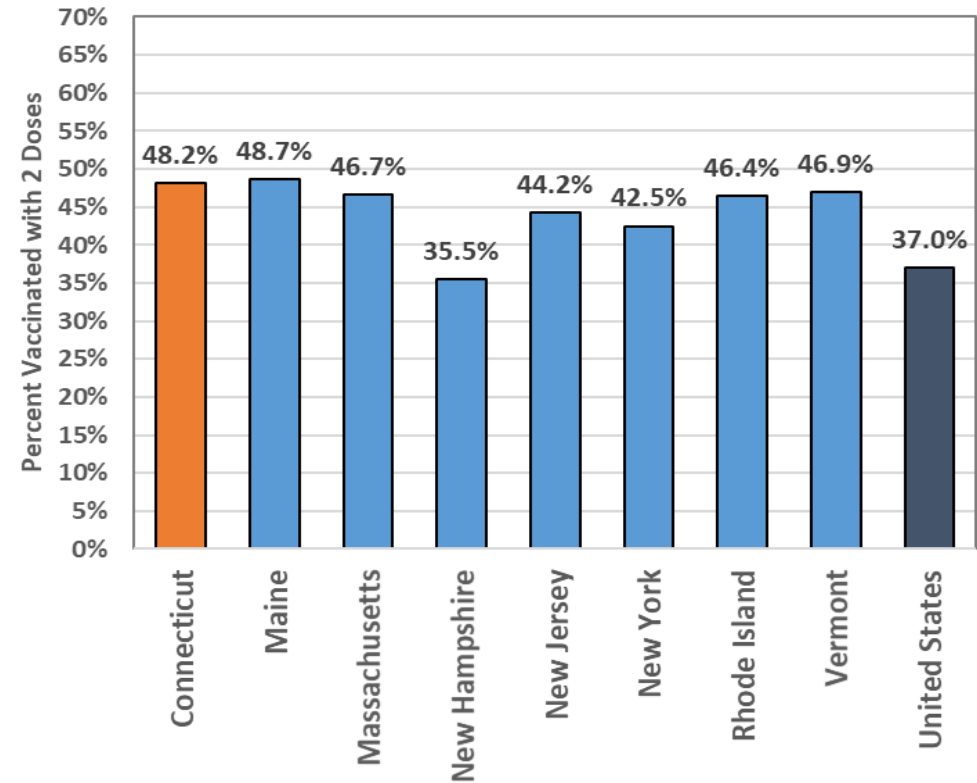
State of Connecticut: Covid 19 Vaccination Rate

Percent of Pop Fully Vaccinated Northeast States

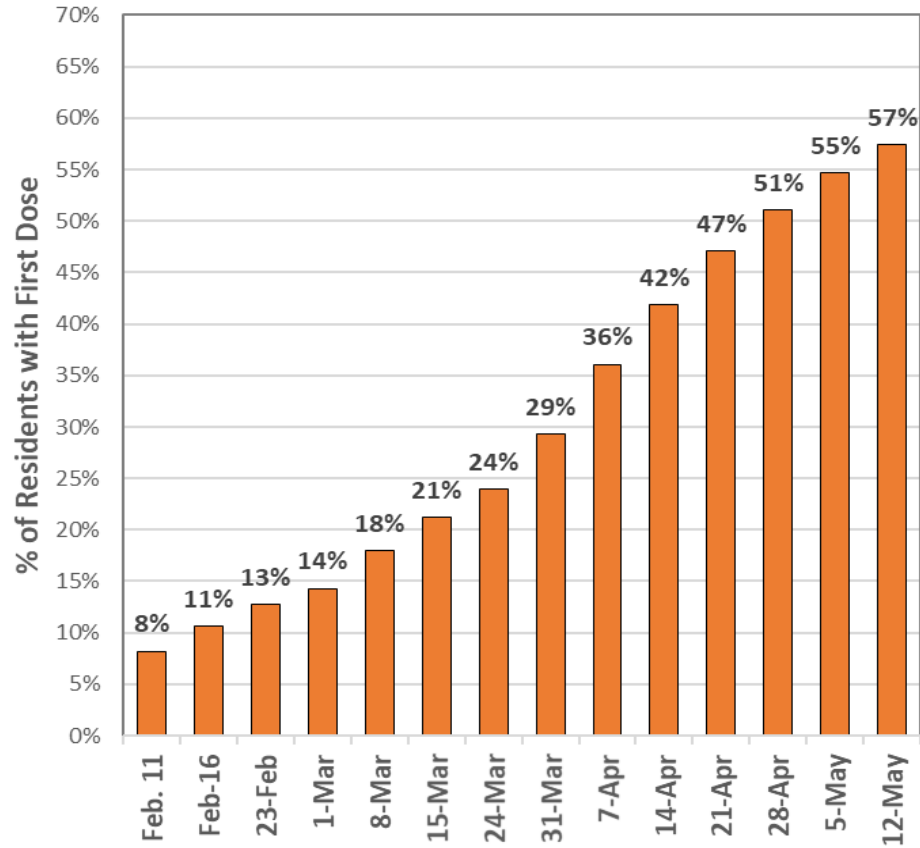

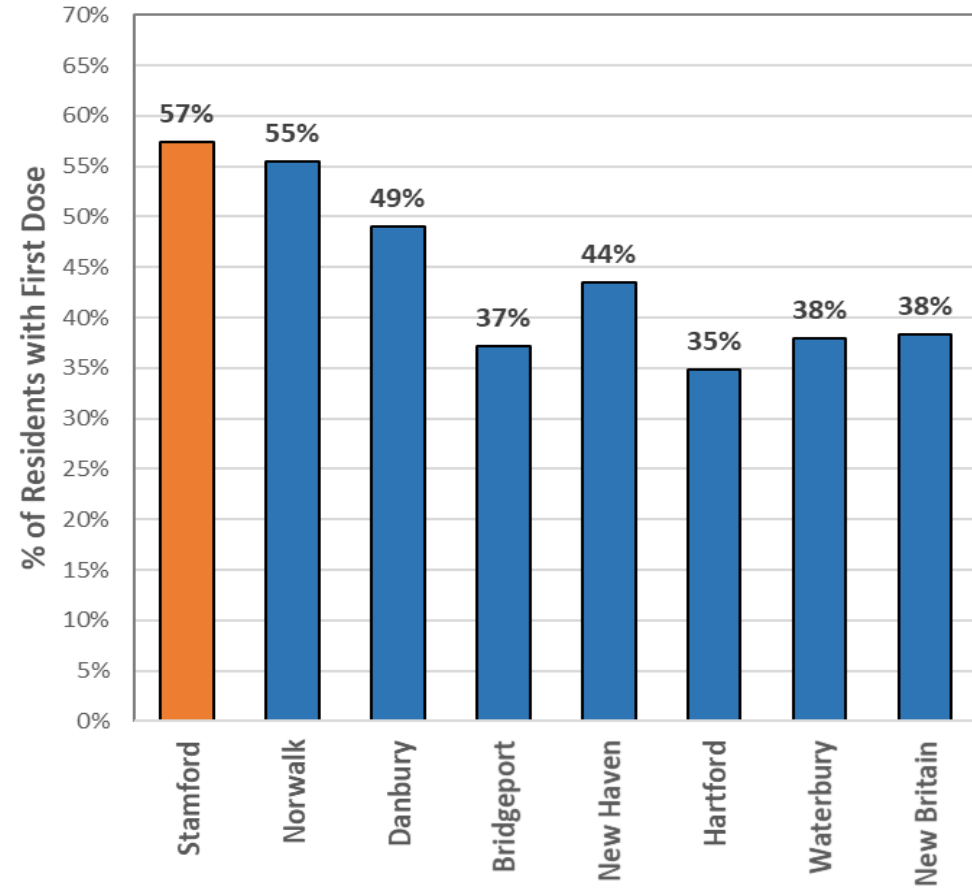

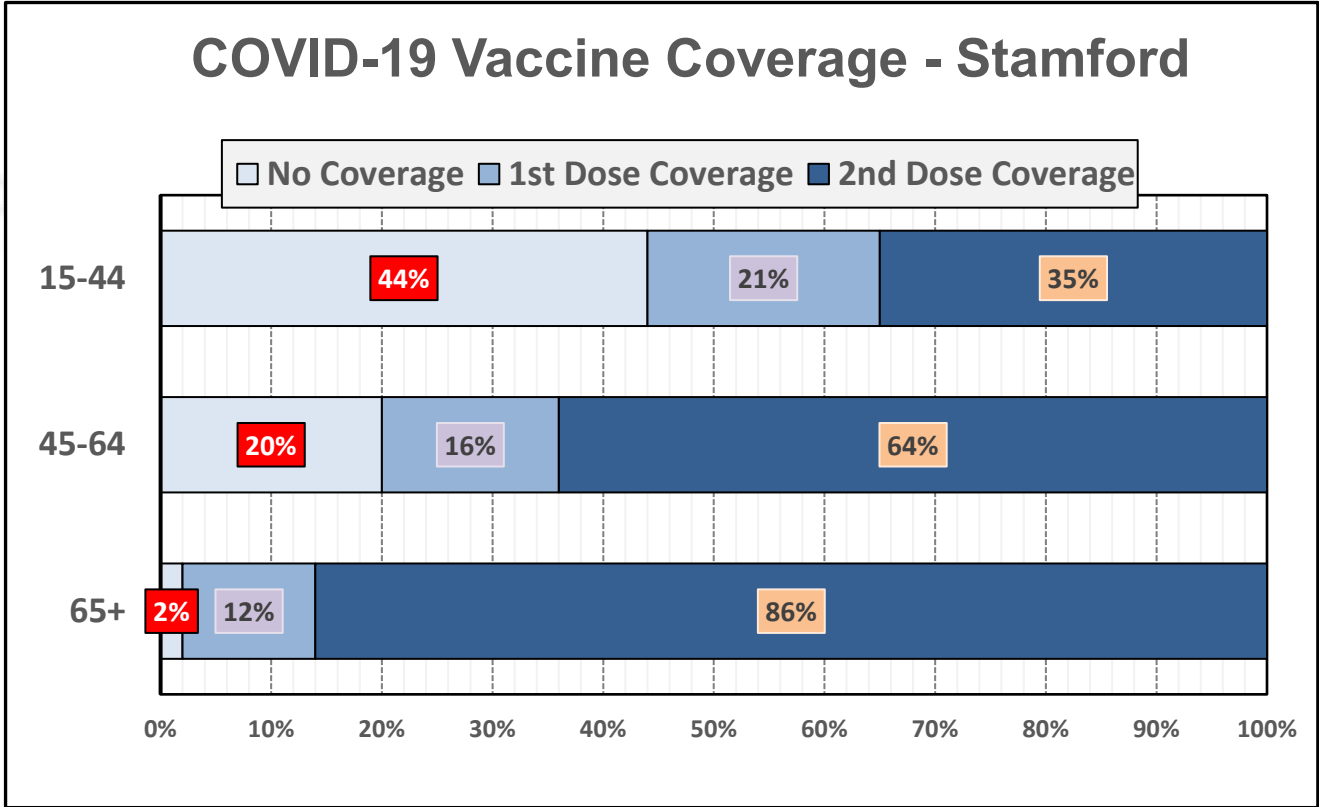
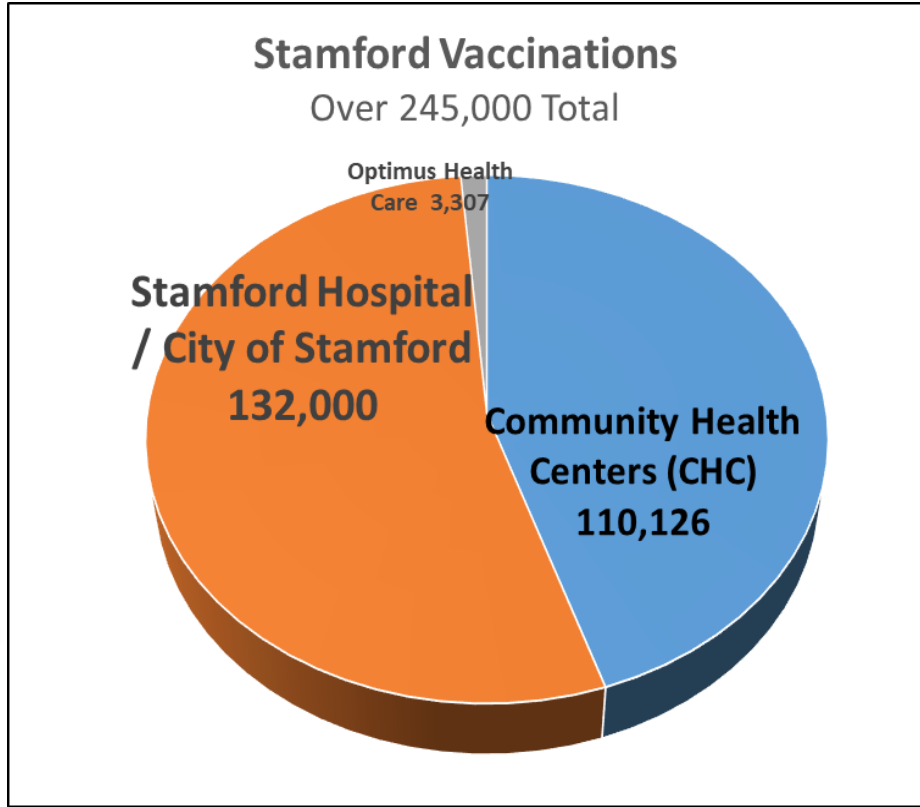
**% of Population with First Dose

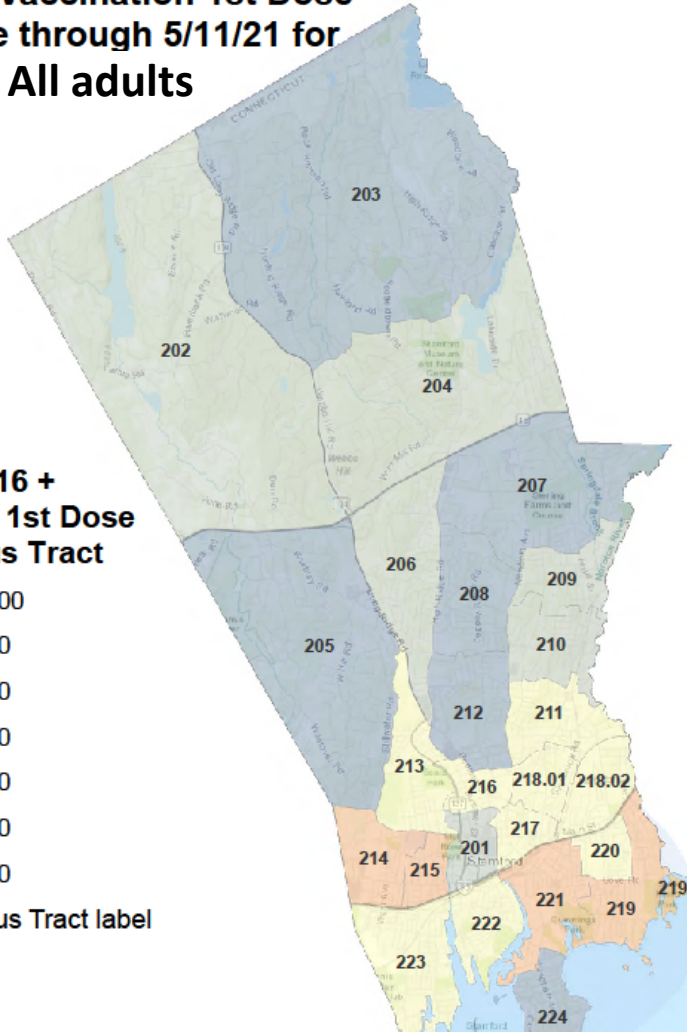


COVID-19 Vaccination 1st Dose Coverage through 5/11/21 for All adults

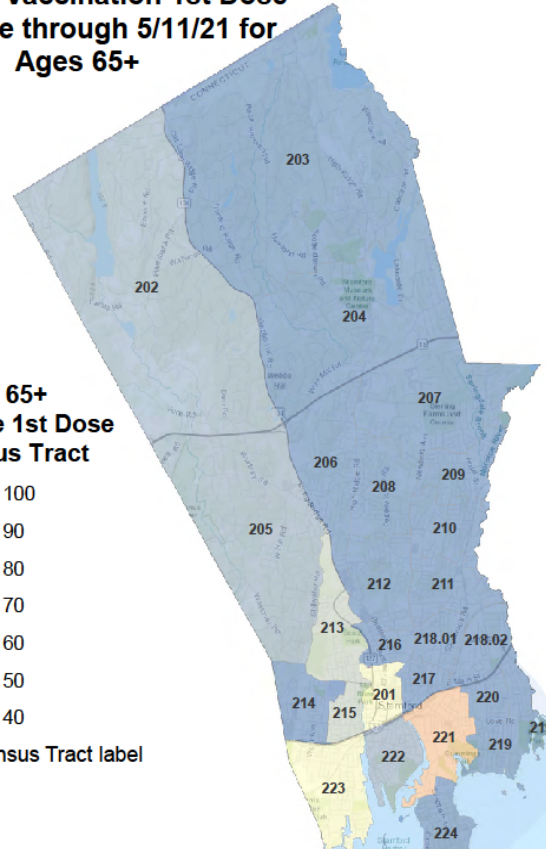

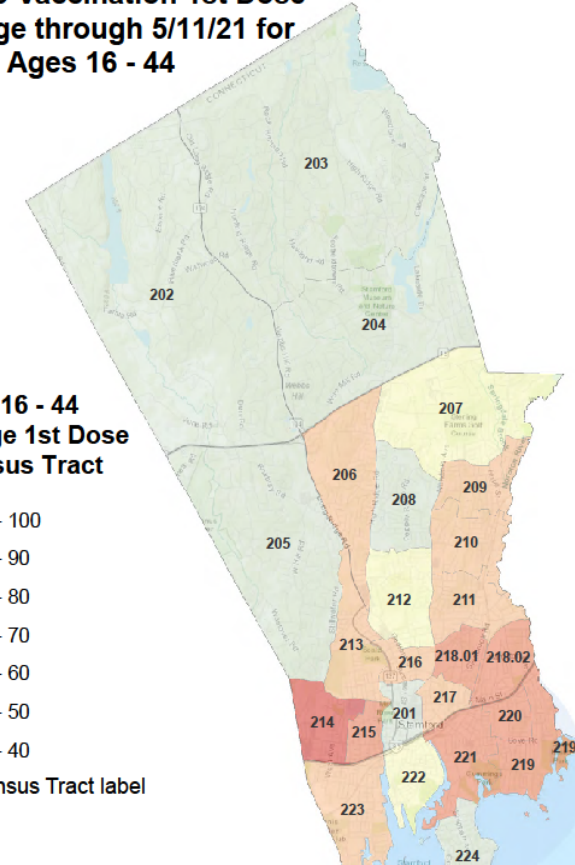

Governor Lamont Announces Updated Mask Protocols in Connecticut Beginning May 19

Posted on May 17, 2021

(HARTFORD, CT) – Governor Ned Lamont today announced that a new set of COVID-19 safety protocols regarding the use of face masks will be implemented in Connecticut beginning Wednesday, May 19, 2021, as a result of the updated recommendations released late last week from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The new order will include:

Outdoors

- Masks not required

Indoors

- Vaccinated not required to wear masks
- Unvaccinated must continue to wear masks
- Businesses, state and local government offices and events may choose to require universal masking
- Masks will still be required in certain settings such as healthcare facilities, facilities housing vulnerable populations, public and private transit, correctional facilities, schools, and childcare

In addition to the revised order, the Connecticut Department of Public Health on May 19 will issue revised recommendations and considerations for masks in businesses, large gatherings and events, and other settings, as well as more detailed descriptions of the settings where masks will continue to be required.

As was previously announced, all of the other COVID-19 sector rules for businesses that had been implemented in Connecticut will also be lifted on May 19.

- ✓ I can travel domestically without needing to quarantine or get tested either before or after the trip
- ✓ I do not need to wear a mask outdoors. I should always carry a mask just in case I'm in an unusually crowded situation.
- ✓ If I have a significant exposure to a person with COVID-19, I can still be around others and come to work without needing to quarantine (I may need to be tested)
- ✓ I can travel internationally without needing to quarantine after I return, although I should still get tested (you will still need a test to board your return flight and your foreign destination may have its own requirements)



COVID-19 Vaccine Updates – CDC May 14

- Vaccination of children and adolescents
- Co-administration with other vaccines
 - No longer require 14-day separation
- Provision for accepting WHO-approved vaccination administered abroad
- No interchangeability of vaccines, but exceptions allowed
- Multisystem inflammatory syndrome
 - Delay vaccination until recovery + 90 days
- Considerations for vaccinating immunosuppressed patients
 - Continue to mask
- Special advice for J&J vaccine
 - Women <50yo -- advise about risks
 - Anyone with ITP and thrombosis – delay vaccination

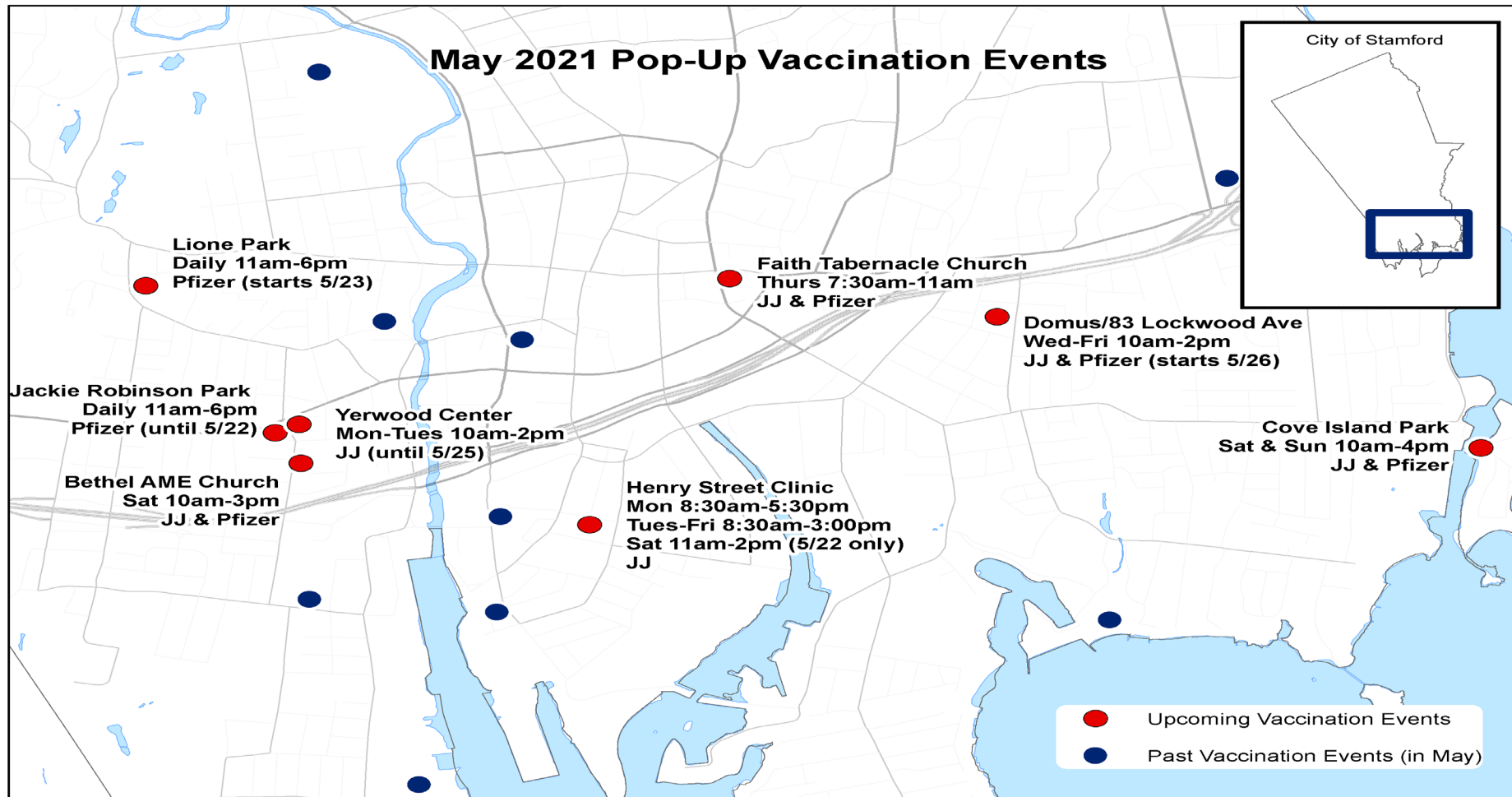
